### A Year in Review

In 2016, the Breastfeeding Coalition of Washington (BCW) continued to build upon the foundation of 2015's work. This year the BCW...

- Welcomed 2 new Coordinating **Team members**: Kristine Brewer from Spokane Regional Health District & Stacy Hackenmueller from Yakima Valley Farm Workers Clinic
- Created engaging & informative breastfeeding equity trainings:
- Facilitated 3 webinars: Challenging Implicit Bias to Achieve Equity & Justice, Challenging Bias in Hiring, and Breastfeeding and Partnerships: Improving African American **Breastfeeding Rates**

- Hosted the stakeholder's breakfast, Building a Breastfeeding Friendly King County: Our Collective **Responsibility**, which addressed African American health disparities and outcomes and how breastfeeding is the ultimate prevention tool. (More on pg.2)
- **Engaged with community** coalitions around sustainability and capacity **building** (Read more on pg.3):
- Re-established the Yakima Valley **Breastfeeding Coalition**
- Assisted Pierce County Breastfeeding Alliance with their 1st annual Breastfeeding Olympic Conference and hosted an Open House to increase membership.

- Helped Mahogony Moms increase capacity. Mahogony Moms is a community-based coalition focused on educating and supporting African American women to breastfeed their infants to ensure survival, protection, and development.
- Presented a workshop at the **United States Breastfeeding** Committee's annual conference in Arlington, VA. The Breastfeeding Promotion Manager and 3 Washington delegates attended this year's conference which focused on community engagement and racial equity.

Building a
Breastfeeding Friendly
King County: Our
Collective
Responsibility

On November 4<sup>th</sup>, WithinReach Breastfeeding Promotion Program hosted a community breakfast called "Building a Breastfeeding Friendly King County: Our Collective Responsibility" at the Tukwila Community Center. With support from the Pacific Hospital Preservation & Development Association, Washington State Department of Health and Public Health Seattle King County, the breakfast engaged the King County community to be agents of change in support of African American families and to provide education on how breastfeeding improves health outcomes. More than 60 people listened to WithinReach's CEO, Kay Knox and director of Public Health—Seattle & King County, Patty Hayes, speak about the importance of this issue and its impact on King County. Dr. Ben Danielson of Odessa Brown

Children's Clinic delivered the keynote presentation titled, "Breastfeeding: the Ultimate Prevention Tool". Maternal-child health specialist and doula, LeAnn Brock shared her personal experience as a breastfeeding African American mother and discussed how historical trauma can influence one's experience. The day culminated with a group activity presented by Cultures Connecting that focused on crosscultural engagement, how community partners can have courageous conversations, and how "circles of influence" affect change. The event and the speakers were well received. Attendees were empowered to take action within their communities to support breastfeeding and better health outcomes for African American families. In 2017, the BCW will continue to offer free, quarterly webinars focused on breastfeeding and health inequities for low-income women and women of color.

# Community Coalition Building and Increasing Sustainability

One of BCW's priorities for 2016 was to engage with local coalitions to increase capacity and sustainability, particularly focusing on barriers identified by local WIC staff. The BCW worked with Yakima Valley, Pierce County, and Mahogony Moms (a coalition focused on supporting African American mothers) to revitalize coalition efforts.

Yakima Valley

For a number of years the Yakima coalition was inactive. In that time, community members expressed interest in reestablishing a coalition in Yakima Valley. The BCW conducted a Needs Assessment and Engagement Plan in June to identify breastfeeding barriers in the community. The BCW hosted an Open House Kick-Off Meeting on September 29<sup>th</sup> and invited community

members from across all sectors. The invitation was open to anyone who supports breastfeeding and health communities. The Open House was a big success with almost 40 people in attendance. Stacy Hackenmueller volunteered to lead the Yakima Valley Breastfeeding Coalition and 26 people expressed interest in joining. The coalition recently held their first meeting on January 12, 2017.

Pierce County

2016 has been a year of tremendous growth for the Pierce County

Breastfeeding Alliance. On September 13<sup>th</sup> they hosted their 1<sup>st</sup> Breastfeeding

Olympic Conference at Chamber's Bay.

The conference touted an impressive line-up of speakers- Ginna Wall,

Cynthia Good Mojab and Dr. Tinneca

Fortin, to name a few, who shared their

expertise and resources. In October, the Alliance became a nonprofit organization and registered for 501C3 status. We are excited to see the possibilities that will come about on this path. Lastly, in November the BCW facilitated a presentation at Sea Mar Clinic in Lakewood to engage the Pierce County Community and coalition members in an action plan to develop strategies for community engagement.

#### Mahogony Moms

The Mahogony Moms Breastfeeding
Coalition was reestablished in the fall of
2016. A Kick-Off Open House Meeting
will be scheduled for Spring 2017 to
engage the community in an action plan
to develop strategies to support African
American mothers and breastfeeding.
